Background:

The Algoma District Services Administration Board (ADSAB) Homelessness Prevention plan provides funding for organizations to assist individuals with supports that prevent Homelessness. These supports can include drop-in, emergency shelter stays, food delivery/outreach service, food bank, outreach, personal items/clothing/household items, mental health/illness/substance use supports and services, crisis prevention, transportation service, and information/service navigation/referrals.

The Trefry Centre is applying for support for the increasing food and milage costs for the Meals on Wheels Program and the Transportation Program in order to keep the options affordable to those accessing service.

The PSW Outreach program is applying for support for its direct client services.

Funding amounts provided will be based on availability and program needs.

Financial Implications:

ADSAB will fund 100% of approved expenses. There are no additional costs to the Township.

Options:

Council may approve staff to apply for both programs or may defer or deny the request to apply for this funding.

Calls For Service (CFS) Billing Summary Report





Re: Household Food Insecurity

At its meeting on January 18, 2024, the Board of Health carried the following resolution #06-24:

WHEREAS food security is a chronic and worsening health issue as documented by annual local data on food affordability and as recognized by multiple Association of Local Public Health Agencies (alPHa) resolutions: AO5-18 (Adequate Nutrition for Ontario Works and Ontario Disability Support Program), A18-02 (Minimum Wage that is a Living Wage), A15-04 (Basic Income Guarantee), and A23-05 (Monitoring Food Affordability in Ontario and the Inadequacy of Social Assistance Rates)

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Board of Health for Public Health Sudbury & Districts call on the provincial government to incorporate local food affordability findings in determining adequacy of social assistance rates to reflect the current costs of living and to index Ontario Works rates to inflation going forward; and

THAT in the context of the Public Health Strengthening roles and responsibilities deliberations, the Board of Health urge all health system partners to remain committed to population health assessment and surveillance as it relates to monitoring food environments and, specifically, to monitoring food affordability; and share this motion broadly with local and provincial stakeholders.

Household food insecurity is one of the strongest predictors of poor health, making it a serious public health issue (PROOF, 2023). Individuals who are food insecure are at higher risk of diet-related diseases like diabetes and are at higher risk for a wide range of chronic conditions such as depression and anxiety disorders, arthritis, and chronic pain. Household food insecurity leaves an indelible mark on children's health and well-being (PROOF, 2023). The experience of food insecurity in childhood is associated with mental health concerns throughout childhood and into early adulthood (PROOF, 2023). In Ontario, the healthcare costs of individuals who are the most food insecure can be more than double that of individuals who are food secure (PROOF, 2023, Tarasuk et al., 2015).

Thank you for your attention to this important issue – the solutions for which will not only help many Ontarians in need but also protect the sustainability of our critical health and social services resources.

Re: Provincial Regulations Needed to Restrict Keeping of Non-native ("exotic") Wild Animals

Dear Premier Ford.

At its meeting held on April 8, 2024, St. Catharines City Council approved the following motion:

WHEREAS Ontario has more private non-native ("exotic") wild animal keepers, roadside zoos, mobile zoos, wildlife exhibits and other captive wildlife operations than any other province; and

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario has of yet not developed regulations to prohibit or restrict animal possession, breeding, or use of non-native ("exotic") wild animals in captivity; and

WHEREAS non-native ("exotic") wild animals can pose very serious human health and safety risks, and attacks causing human injury and death have occurred in the province; and

WHEREAS the keeping of non-native ("exotic") wild animals can cause poor animal welfare and suffering, and poses risks to local environments and wildlife; and

WHEREAS owners of non-native ("exotic") wild animals can move from one community to another even after their operations have been shut down due to animal welfare or public health and safety concerns; and

WHEREAS municipalities have struggled, often for months or years, to deal with non-native ("exotic") wild animal issues and have experienced substantive regulatory, administrative, enforcement and financial challenges; and



WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Association of Municipal Managers, Clerks and Treasurers of Ontario (AMCTO) and the Municipal Law Enforcement Officers' Association (MLEOA) have indicated their support for World Animal Protection's campaign for provincial regulations of nonnative ("exotic") wild animals and roadside zoos in letters to the Ontario Solicitor General and Ontario Minister for Natural Resources and Forestry;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of St. Catharines hereby petitions the provincial government to implement provincial regulations to restrict the possession, breeding, and use of non-native ("exotic") wild animals and license zoos in order to guarantee the fair and consistent application of policy throughout Ontario for the safety of Ontario's citizens and the non-native ("exotic") wild animal population; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution will be forwarded to all municipalities in Ontario for support, the Premier of Ontario, Ontario Solicitor General, Ontario Minister for Natural Resources and Forestry, MPP Jennie Stevens, MPP Sam Oosterhoff, MPP Jeff Burch, AMO, AMCTO, and MLEAO.

 - iii) particulars of the outcome of the investigation, matter or case including the Ombudsman's findings, conclusions and recommendations, if any.
- b) That the City Clerk forward Council's resolutions resulting from Council's approval of these recommendations to Minister Calandra, MPP David Smith, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and to the municipal Clerks of Ontario's municipalities.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ST. JOSEPH

BY-LAW 2024- 14

A BY-LAW TO AMEND BY-LAW NO. 2011-34 OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ST. JOSEPH TO UPDATE THE DEFINITION FOR BED AND BREAKFAST ESTABLISHMENTS, AND

TO ADD A DEFINITION FOR SHORT TERM RESIDENTIAL RENTAL ACCOMODATION, AND

TO ADD SHORT TERM RESIDENTIAL RENTALS AS A PERMITTED USE IN CERTAIN MUNICIPAL ZONES.

WHEREAS the Corporation of the Township of St. Joseph has enacted by-law No. 2011-34, being the Comprehensive Zoning By-law for the Township of St. Joseph, which regulates the use of land, the erection, location and use of buildings and structures, and the provision and maintenance of loading and parking facilities within the Township of St. Joseph; and

WHEREAS the Council of the Township of St. Joseph deems it desirous and expedient to amend said by-law to provide for the regulation of short-term residential rental accommodation (STR) uses, and

WHEREAS a new Official Plan, dated July 2023, has been adopted by all of the municipalities within the St. Joseph Island Planning Area, including the Township of St. Joseph, to revise and replace the current Official Plan for St. Joseph Island, and

WHEREAS the newly adopted Official Plan has been submitted for approval by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, and includes policies to provide for the regulation of short-term residential rental accommodations through zoning and other controls, and

WHEREAS notice of this proposed amendment was published in accordance with the provisions of Section 34 of the Planning Act, and a public meeting was held on April 17, 2024, to consider the proposed amendment and provide an opportunity for public comment;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of St. Joseph enacts as follows:

- 1. By-law No. 2011-34 of the Township of St. Joseph is hereby amended as follows:
 - 1. The definition of "Bed and Breakfast Establishment" included in section 3.0 Definitions, is deleted in its entirety, and replaced by the following:

BED AND BREAKFAST ESTABLISHMENT

Means a part of a *dwelling unit* or an *accessory building* thereto, which is occupied by the owner thereof, and in which bedrooms are used or maintained for the accommodation of the traveling public, in which the owner of the *dwelling unit* supplies lodgings with or without meals for hire or pay, but does not include a *group home*, *tourist establishment*, *hotel*, *motel*, inn, or *short-term rental accommodation*.

2. Section 3.0 Definitions is amended by the addition of the following:

SHORT-TERM RESIDENTIAL RENTAL ACCOMMODATION

Means a building or structure or any part thereof that operates or offers a place of temporary residence, lodging or occupancy for hire or pay by way or concession, permit, lease, license, rental agreement, or similar arrangement for any period of twenty-eight (28) or less consecutive calendar days, throughout all

or any part of a calendar year. Short term residential rental accommodation uses shall not mean or include a *group home, bed and breakfast establishment, tourist establishment, hotel, motel,* inn or similar commercial or institutional use.

- 3. Shown on the Attached Schedule "A', being the revised Zoning By-Law Tables A1, A2 and A3, hereto forming part of this By-law.
- 4. Table A1 Residential Zones is amended by the addition of Short-term Residential Rental Accommodation to the Permitted Uses of the R1 (Residential One), R2 (residential Two) and SR (Shoreline Residential) zones.
- 5. Table A2 Commercial and Industrial Zones is amended by the addition of Short-term Residential Rental Accommodation to the Permitted Uses of the GC (General Commercial) and HC (Highway Commercial) Zones.
- 1. Table A3 Rural and Recreational Zones is amended by the addition of Short-term Residential Rental Accommodation to the Permitted Uses of the RU (Rural) zone.
- Section 4.12 Multiple Uses On One Lot is amended by the addition of the following new subsection:

 4.12.1 Short-Term Rental Accommodations in RU (Rural) Zone
 Not more than one Short-term Residential Rental Accommodation shall be permitted on each lot within the following zones: Rural (RU), Residential One (R1), Residential Two (R2), Shoreline Residential (SR).
- 2. This By-law shall come into force and effect on the date of final passing, subject to the provisions of Subsection 24(2.1) of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, c. P. 13, as amended.

BY-LAW 2024-16
