The Township of St. Joseph ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT PUBLIC MEETING: Short Term Residential Rentals Wednesday, April 17, 2024 – 6:45 p.m. Council Chambers – 1669 Arthur Street, Richards Landing

The purpose of this Public Meeting is to review a proposed Zoning By-law Amendment in accordance with Section 34 of the Planning Act, as well as to hear comments and review written submissions from the public and other agencies.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSAL

The proposed zoning by-law amendment would:

- 1. Amend the definition for bed and breakfast establishments.
- 2. Add the definition for short-term residential rental accommodations.
- 3. STRS would be added as permitted use within all zones.
- 4. The number of STRs on a property would be limited.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS FROM NEIGHBOURS & AGENCIES

Public Notice of the proposed amendment was distributed to property owners and public agencies in accordance with the provisions of the Planning Act. A letter stating no objection was received from the abutting property owners as well as Algoma Public Health.

The St. Joseph Island Planning Board did not have a meeting within the timeline for response, however, the following comments (summarized) were received from the Secretary/Treasurer:

(The Planning Board) may have some concerns with the proposal as outlined in (your notice). Your notice indicates that STRs are to be added as a permitted use in all zones, I am doubtful that the Board would consider that appropriate as some zones do not currently permit, nor does the Official Plan contemplate, residential uses of any sort in some zones Those zones include the Rural Industrial - M1 Zone, the Business Park - BP Zone, the Extractive Industrial - MX Zone, the Environmental Protection - EP Zone. the Open Space - OS Zone, and the Waste Disposal - WD Zones.

The Planning Board might also question the appropriateness of allowing STRs, as of right, in the Limited Service Residential - LSR Zone as there are usually restrictions on the provision of municipal services to properties in that zone, For example they may not have year-round publicly maintained road access, and full emergency services such as ambulance or fire protection. Because of this any new development or redevelopment of properties in that zone requires that the owner first enter into a site plan agreement to absolve the municipality of any liability which could occur as a result of allowing such development without those services. That waiver of liability may not however extend to someone who rents that property, perhaps without even knowing that such services may not be available. While there may be some ways around that liability issue, they may be best dealt with on a site-specific basis by requiring a zoning amendment review process and possibly specific conditions to be fulfilled before allowing STRs in the LSR Zone.

COMMENTS & QUESTIONS FROM PUBLIC

ANY PERSON may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed amendment. If a person or public body that files an appeal of a decision of The Township of St. Joseph in respect of the proposed amendment does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to The Township of St. Joseph before the proposed amendment is adopted, the Ontario Land Tribunal may dismiss all or part of the appeal.

If anyone wishes to speak to the proposed zoning by-law amendment, speakers must state their name and address so that proper records may be kept in accordance with the Planning Act, and so that notice of future decisions can be sent to those persons involved in the review process.

<u>REPLY</u>

- Members of Council may ask questions for clarification of specific matters.
- Members of the public may respond to points clarified by Council and amendments suggested by staff.

FINAL STATEMENT

If there are no further questions or submissions, Council wishes to thank those in attendance for their participation. If the By-law is approved and passed by Council today, it will take effect following a 20-day appeal period where no eligible person or body has submitted an objection to the Ontario Land Tribunal.

Background

A contract was awarded as part of a competitive RFQ to resurface, upgrade fence and purchase nets for the Pickle ball courts at the WI Park. The project also includes upgrades and additions to asphalt pathways, extending the entry pad to the public washrooms and installing a water bottle refilling station for public use.

Upon review by the contactor there were a number of additional units required that were not captured in the original RFQ. The contractor explained the rationale for the changes to staff. With additional items the quote would still be best value, and not exceed the maximum allowed for the NOHFC Grant.

The proposed changes include:

- Additional gravel substrate for 12" under new pathways
- Extend 6' high pickleball fence with new 10' heavy posts
- Extend court area 10ft to south including asphalt, fence, posts, gate and windscreen, creating extra court space
- Excavate perimeter of pickleball court for roots affecting court surface

The full costed change order request is attached.

Financial Implications

NOHFC will fund 90% of the project up to a total construction renovation budget of \$189,030. The total updated construction/renovation cost, with change orders, would be \$175,000 plus HST. The Township of St. Joseph is responsible for 10% of the costs. The Pickleball group has collected over \$12,000 in donations towards the project which can be applied as a portion of the 10%. The remaining \$5,500 would be the responsibility of the Township and will need to be budgeted in 2024 from the Parks Capital Reserve Fund.

Summary

Council may accept the change order as outlined and amend the contract, defer their decision, or consider other options.

Background

The municipality typically employs 5 summer positions annually, 2-3 marina, 1 parks & recreation and 1 public works. All positions are paid at regular minimum wage which is \$16.55 per hour in 2024 (current student minimum wage is \$15.60 per hour). 4 of the summer positions are usually partially funded through the Canada Summer Jobs program which funds approximately 40% of wages per position.

For several years, Council has approved a \$100 bonus for those who complete the season satisfactorily. In the fall of 2023, Council discussed changing this approach to an annual increase for those who return for multiple seasons. Staff recommends that Council consider \$1 per hour for each additional season of work. Other amounts could be considered or an increasing scale such as \$.50, \$1.00, etc.

Financial Implications

There would be savings of \$500 for bonuses typically paid which would partially cover any increases granted for the season. For 2024, there is one returning summer position that would be eligible for an increase (3rd season of employment). Increase impacts will be included in the 2024 budgets by department.

Summary

Council may choose to accept the recommendation of \$1/hr. per additional season, or consider other amounts, defer their decision or choose to remain with the existing bonus system currently in place.

Details of Application

The attached notice of application for consent was received from the St. Joseph Island Planning Board for the property located at Lot 3 CON E (973 D Line Road). The applicants wish to sever Lot 3, Concession E, in the Township of St. Joseph, into two parcels. The proposed parcels would consist of approximately 20 hectares (50 acres) each and would both have frontage of about 200 metres (660 ft.) on D Line Road.

The subject lands are zoned Rural and are in the Rural land use designation and are used for farm/residential and agricultural purposes. The proposed new lot is vacant farmland. The parcel to be retained contains a dwelling and accessory structures. The subject lands are surrounded by agricultural uses including farm/residential and livestock uses. The intended use of the new lot to be created would remain farm residential/agricultural in nature.

The current and proposed usage of the subject property and adjacent properties are agricultural including farm residences. Both the severed and retained parcels are proposed for farm/residential use. The zoning by-law permits both detached dwellings and agricultural uses in the Rural – RU Zone in which the subject property is located and establishes a minimum lot size of 2 ha with at least 150 metres road frontage. The proposed new lot and the retained lot meet the use, size and location requirements outlined in the Official Plan and the municipality's zoning by-law.

Financial Implications

There are no financial implications resulting from this report.



Please be advised that at its April 8, 2024 City Council meeting, Sault Ste. Marie City Council passed the following resolution:

Whereas the jury that heard the Carol Culleton, Anastasia Kuzyk, and Nathalie Warmerdam inquest (The Renfrew County Inquest) issued 86 recommendations to prevent future deaths and delivered those recommendations to the Province of Ontario; and

Whereas recommendation #85 of the inquest is to include "coercive control", as defined in the *Divorce Act*, as a criminal offence or as a type of assault under section 265 of the *Criminal Code*; and

Whereas according to experts, a perpetrator has privileged access to information about the target by virtue of the closeness of an intimate relationship and, as such, is able to identify unique vulnerabilities that can be exploited for coercive control; and

Whereas Coordinating Community Responses to Domestic Violence cites scholars and advocates in the field have consistently described intimate partner violence as both an expression of, and an attempt to maintain, power and control over intimate partners; and

Whereas in 2019, according to the Government of Canada, of the 107,810 people aged 15 and over who experienced intimate partner violence 79% were women. 55% of women who experienced physical or sexual intimate partner violence feared a partner at some point. Being afraid of a partner can indicate intimate partner violence that is more coercive, more severe, and more likely to reflect a pattern of abusive behaviours; and

Whereas between 2014 and 2019 in Canada, there were 497 victims of intimate partner homicide, and 80% (400 victims) were women; and

Whereas while Indigenous women account for about 5% of all women in Canada, they accounted for 21% of women killed by an intimate partner between 2014 and 2019 (83 victims). In 2021, the rate of gender-related homicide of Indigenous women and girls was more than triple that of gender-related homicides of women and girls overall (1.72 versus 0.54 per 100,000 women and girls); and

Whereas the Government of Canada names coercive control as one of the acts included in intimate partner violence, but does not include coercive control as an offence contained within the *Criminal Code* of Canada* and

Whereas Bill C332, a private member's bill to amend the Criminal Code to create an offence of exercising coercive control of an intimate partner by engaging in a pattern of conduct that consists of any combination, or any repeated instances, of any of the following acts: using, attempting to use or threatening to use violence against certain persons, coercing or attempting to coerce the intimate partner to engage in sexual activity or engaging in other conduct that could reasonably be expected to cause the intimate partner to believe that their safety, or the safety of a person known to them, is threatened**

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that the Sault Ste. Marie City Council express its support for Bill C-332 as well as call on the Government of Canada to support Bill C-332 and enact the necessary amendments to the *Criminal Code* of Canada to include coercive control of an intimate partner; and

Further it be resolved that a copy of this motion be circulated to the Right Honourable Justin Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, the Honourable Dominic LeBlanc, Minister of Public Safety, the Honourable Patty Hajdu, Minister of Indigenous Services, the Honourable Mark Holland, Minister of Health, the Honourable Marci Ien, Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Youth, the Honourable Jenna Sudds, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, the Honourable Arif Virani, Minister of Justice, City of Sault Ste Marie MP Terry Sheehan, MP Laurel Collins, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities, Federation of Canadian Municipalities, and all Ontario municipalities.

Please be advised that during the regular Council meeting of March 26, 2024 the following resolution regarding support for 'a call to action' to meet the deadline of an Accessible Ontario by 2025 was carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024-151

DATE: March 26, 2024

MOVED BY: Councillor MacNaughton

SECONDED BY: Councillor Pennell

WHEREAS the Accessibility for Ontarians With Disabilities Act (AODA) is groundbreaking legislation, created to help people with disabilities fully participate in society, bring them to the table in crafting regulations, and build mechanisms to enforce standards;

WHEREAS Rich Donovan, an expert in accessibility issues, was appointed as the Independent Reviewer of the Act in 2022, and in his 2023 legislative review declared a crisis as a necessary catalyst to get Ontario back on track for accessibility;

WHEREAS at least 2.9 million Ontarians currently live with a disability, representing at least 22% of the consumer base and the workforce, but due to barriers, Ontarians with disabilities are too often falling short of their full potential;

WHEREAS the AODA aims to develop, implement and enforce standards related to goods, services, accommodation, employment and buildings before Jan. 1, 2025, and municipalities, as the level of government closest to the people are at the front lines, developing, implementing and enforcing these standards without meaningful guidance on its implementation and/or enforcement by the Province;

WHEREAS people with disabilities and advocates, including Prince Edward County's Accessibility Advisory Committee, note the slow pace of current and previous Ontario governments in implementing the AODA and there are growing concerns there will be no renewed push to keep accessibility issues at the forefront after 2025;

WHEREAS Prince Edward County is dedicated and committed to creating a welcoming environment so that all people may have equitable access to programs, goods, services and facilities, but making investments to achieve the AODA

standards has been challenging given the lack of consistent and stable funding for municipalities to remove accessibility barriers;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of Prince Edward County strongly encourages action on the part of the Provincial Government to urgently:

- a) create a "Municipal Accessibility Fund" for municipalities to develop, implement and enforce AODA standards related to goods, services, accommodation, employment and buildings. Such a fund could be modeled after the Canada Community-Building Fund or the Ontario Cannabis Legalization Implementation Fund on a per household basis;
- **b)** to commit to working with municipalities to implement the Donovan Review immediate crisis recommendations;

AND FURTHER THAT the Mayor write a letter in support of this resolution to the Minister of Seniors and Accessibility, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Seniors and Accessibility, the Minister of Children, Community, and Social Services, the Minister of Health, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, and the Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus, and all Ontario Municipalities.

RE: Guelph City Council Resolution to Support the Decision of the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) to End the Subsidization of Fossil Gas

Dear Premier Ford and Minister Smith,

Guelph City Council at its meeting held on March 26, 2024 passed the following resolution in support of the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) decision to revise the revenue horizon for calculating the upfront cost for new natural gas connections, and to end the Gas Pipeline Subsidy:

WHEREAS, residents are struggling with energy bill increases and need relief;

WHEREAS, natural gas is no longer the cheapest way to heat homes because electric heat pumps are now much more efficient, can provide all heating needs even in the cold climates, and result in far lower energy bills over the long term compared to gas heating;

WHEREAS, natural gas is methane gas, which is a fossil fuel that causes approximately one-third of Ontario's GHG emissions, and must be phased out because it is inconsistent with all climate targets, while heat pumps result in the lowest GHG emissions and are consistent with a zero-carbon future;

WHEREAS, the Ontario Energy Board ("OEB") decided to end a subsidy for methane gas pipelines to be built in new construction developments, effective 2025, finding that this would lower energy bills for existing gas customers and improve affordability for new homebuyers, but this decision is at risk of being overturned by the provincial government;

WHEREAS, the OEB decision will help lower energy bills and encourage heating systems that are consistent with climate targets and plans; City Hall 1 Carden St Guelph, ON Canada N1H 3A1

WHEREAS, the construction of new methane gas pipelines, which have 60-year lifetimes, should not be subsidized because they are inconsistent with the City's climate targets and will result in higher carbon emissions, higher energy bills, higher future decarbonization retrofit costs to get off fossil fuel heating, and a continued financial drain as dollars leave the province to pay for fossil fuels extracted in other jurisdictions;

WHEREAS, Guelph City Council acknowledged the climate crisis (May 2019), passed a resolution to support the phase-out of gas-fired energy plants by 2030 (December 2020); and passed a resolution of support to the United Nations Race to Zero commitment (December 2021);

WHEREAS, transforming our existing and new buildings by supporting actions that improve the energy efficiency and GHG profile within the City is a stated goal of our Community Energy Initiative (CEI), our Official Plan and our Strategic Plan;

WHEREAS, the City of Guelph is actively working to support the decarbonization of heating and cooling systems in existing and future building stock within the community, as demonstrated by the Guelph Green Homes Energy Retrofit Program, which will provide 0% interest loans to Guelph homeowners to enable them to transition away from fossil-fuel powered heating and cooling equipment to low carbon air or ground source heat pump systems.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

(a) That the City of Guelph expresses its support for the decision of the Ontario Energy Board to end the fossil gas infrastructure subsidy and requests that the Ontario Government withdraw Bill 165 and allow the OEB decision to stand; and

(b) That this resolution be circulated to the President of Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Colin Best; Premier of Ontario, Doug Ford; Minister of Energy, Todd Smith; Minister of Finance, Peter Bethlenfalvy, MPP Mike Schreiner, and all Ontario Municipalities requesting support for the proposed changes.
